

Background:

The inaugural CFL Alumni Association Man of the Year award was presented in 2008 at an exclusive Alumni event during Canadian Football Hall of Fame Weekend (first time in Winnipeg) at the Manitoba Club.

A nominee from each Alumni Association was submitted to the CFLAA Board of Directors. The Board unanimously selected Sam Etchevery.

Unfortunately, Sam passed two weeks before the event. The award was presented to his brother, Steve Etchevery, by Paul Robson. The event's emcee was Wade Miller.

In 2010 the Board decided to have the local Alumni Association of the host Grey Cup city make the selection for the award to be presented at the CFLAA Legends Luncheon.

The CFLAA Board renamed the CFLAA Man of the Year to CFLAA Alumnus of the Year.

The recipients are honored each year at the CFLAA Legends Luncheon during Grey Cup week.

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CANADIAN CONCUSSION CENTRE

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The Canadian Concussion Centre is the world's first program dedicated to a four-pronged approach to concussions: research, education, diagnosis and treatment. The project is based at the Krembil Neuroscience Centre at the University Health Network's Toronto Western Hospital, and is led by internationally acclaimed concussion expert, Dr. Charles Tator. The team includes world leaders in brain injury, cognition, imaging, mental health and clinical care working together to determine how concussions can affect us all.

The **CFL Alumni Association** has taken a leadership role in promoting research and awareness of brain injury and concussion since its inception in 2012. The CFL alumni involvement includes former players, **Leo Ezerins**, Executive Director, CFL Alumni Association and on the Advisory Group **Matt Dunigan** and **Robert Bronk**, President, CFLAA

The research is designed to better understand the full spectrum of concussions, in particular, persistent symptoms of concussion and the delayed effects of multiple concussions.

Our MISSION is to identify who has and who is at risk of developing the delayed neurodegeneration associated with multiple concussions. We are developing better **diagnostic tools** to detect the effects of multiple concussions, and we are trying to figure out the **underlying causes** of their long term effects. All of the above information is used to **develop mechanism-based treatments** to prevent or minimize the enduring effects of multiple concussions.

Note: The study will cover the travel expenses (hotel, flight, and per diem) incurred to participate in the research program in Toronto. Plan on two days of testing.





CCC Purpose

Since 2011, we are examining the possible correlation between repeated concussions and late deterioration of brain function.

Study Update

To date, 117 athletes including 74 former CFL players have participated in our study, and 34 athletes have completed at least one follow up assessment.

2023 CFLAA Alumnus of the Year

LEO EZERINS




Leo Ezerins' accomplishments both on and off the football field, are well documented.

Ezerins played ten seasons in the CFL for the Winnipeg Blue Bombers and the Hamilton Tiger-Cats and was a 1986 Grey Cup-winning team leader. Ezerins, a graduate of Whitworth College (Hugh Campbell head coach), was a territorial protection of Winnipeg in 1978.

The former Eastern all-star played in 173 career CFL games, registering 13 sacks and 25 interceptions. He's still ranked first all-time in interceptions by a Canadian linebacker. Ezerins also made 23 receptions as a tight end.

After retiring, Ezerins founded the CFL Alumni Association in 2008, with its board creating the CFL Alumni Support Fund to help former players experiencing financial limitations because of medical or other challenges, and the highly popular CFLAA Legends Luncheon during Grey Cup.

Ezerins, an Inductee of Mike Ditka's Gridiron Greats Hall of Fame, is also active on the Canadian Concussion Centre advisory board and the Canadian Sports Concussion Research Project.



ROCKY DIPIETRO

Rocky DiPietro enjoyed a fantastic 14-year career in the CFL with the Hamilton Tiger-Cats—the native of Sault Ste. Marie and, former University of Ottawa Gee Gee, had 706 career receptions for 9,762 yards and 45 touchdowns. DiPietro also surpassed the 1,000-yard mark three times.

DiPietro retired in 1991 after starring in four Grey Cup games and hoisting the Grey Cup in victory in 1986. He was named to the Tiger-Cats Wall of Honour in 1994 and inducted into the Canadian Football Hall of Fame in 1997. DiPietro was also a four-time Eastern all-star and selected All-Canadian twice.

DiPietro was named the CFL Outstanding player twice for his on-field efforts, and was a three-time recipient of the Lew Hayman trophy.

DiPietro became a high school learning strategies and special education teacher after his career. As coach of the Lakeshore Catholic High School football team in Port Colborne, Ontario, DiPietro led them to numerous championships.

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CFLAA INDIGENOUS CHAMPION AWARD

JOHN MACDONALD

HAMILTON - Today, the Canadian Football League Alumni Association (CFLAA) is proud to announce that John Macdonald has won the CFLAA Indigenous Champion Award.

Macdonald will be honoured at the CARSTAR 2023 CFL Legends Luncheon in Hamilton on Friday, November 17.

“John Macdonald is an Indigenous leader who has made an incredible impact on the local community,” said Leo Ezerins, Executive Director of the CFLAA. “The CFLAA is proud to present this honour to John and to highlight his dedication to improving the quality of life of Indigenous people and his overall support of the CFL’s “Diversity is Strength” strategy and truth and reconciliation initiatives.”

John Macdonald, a member of the Mohawk Nation, Wolf Clan, from Six Nations of the Grand River territory, had an outstanding CIS and CFL career as a defensive lineman as well as an amateur football coach.

In 2001, his final CIS campaign, Macdonald earned second team CIS All-Canadian honours at McGill and was selected to the QIFC all-star team. He was also a CIS Academic All-Canadian in 2000.

During the 2002 CFL Draft, Macdonald was selected as a first-round draft pick (7th overall) by the Hamilton Tiger-Cats and went on to play 42 CFL regular season games.

Since leaving the CFL, Macdonald has been coaching high school football at Simcoe Composite School, Waterford District High School, McKinnon Park Secondary School, and Pauline Johnson Collegiate & Vocational School. Macdonald has earned multiple championships, including Pauline Johnson Collegiate's, in 2022, which ended a 16-year drought at the school.

He has also volunteered as a guest coach at the Guelph Gryphons and McGill Redbirds University camps, helping to prepare several players for the CFL.

Macdonald is also the varsity football governor for the Athletic Association of Brant, Haldimand and Norfolk (AABHN). Additionally, Macdonald serves on the Hamilton Tiger-Cat Alumni Association's (HTCAA) Board of Directors, where he has volunteered to be the Indigenous


advisor on the HTCAA, the CFLAA, the Hamilton Tiger-Cats Football Club, and the Canadian Football League.

For his community efforts, Macdonald was inducted into Norfolk Sports Hall of Recognition in 2017 and named the winner of the 2018 Dreamcatcher Charitable Foundation Education Award (a national award presented to an Indigenous person making a significant impact in the field of education).

In 2021, the CFLAA added the Indigenous Champion Award to the event to support the CFL's Diversity Is Strength strategy and the Truth and Reconciliation initiatives.

This prestigious award was created to recognize former Indigenous CFL players and current advocates of Indigenous participants as players or coaches in the game of football.

“It is an honour to again present the CFLAA Indigenous Champion Award during Grey Cup week,” says Dr. Larry Rosia, Saskatchewan Polytechnic President and CEO. “The contributions of Indigenous people are an important part of our campus communities and our country. Congratulations to John Macdonald on this prestigious award. You are a great community leader and role model for students across Canada.”

Our fund was created, and criteria developed, by members of the CFLAA. The Support Fund has two specific plans that provide various amounts of aid depending on each specific situation.

Our Alumni need your support

We need to continue to build the fund so we are better prepared to meet future requests for financial support from your teammates and Alumni. The ever-growing reality of the effects on both the body and mind from playing football will increase the need for the Support Fund. As you know, current medical coverage aids with a very limited time post career, and this has only been available to alumni for the last few years. There are also recent challenges that COVID has had on everyone's financial and life situations.

Support Fund has helped many former CFL players

- Recently, a former Hall of Fame player and CFL coach needed lower back surgery which left him unable to walk unassisted. We are helping by subsidizing the intensive physical therapy required so that he will be able to walk unassisted, and most importantly, be independent.
- The CFLAA, and 3 teams for which the individual played, contributed funds to an Alumnus who has had a lifelong

challenge with mental illness to assist in his medical expenses and costs to set himself up for his transition from hospital care back to independent living.

- The CFLASF aided an Alumnus and his family while his wife recovered from major surgeries for treatment of her cancer.
- We supported a member after years of struggle, including loss of family, who had admitted himself into a drug and alcohol treatment facility.

Your generosity will be used to assist your former teammates and all CFL alumni who are in need.


