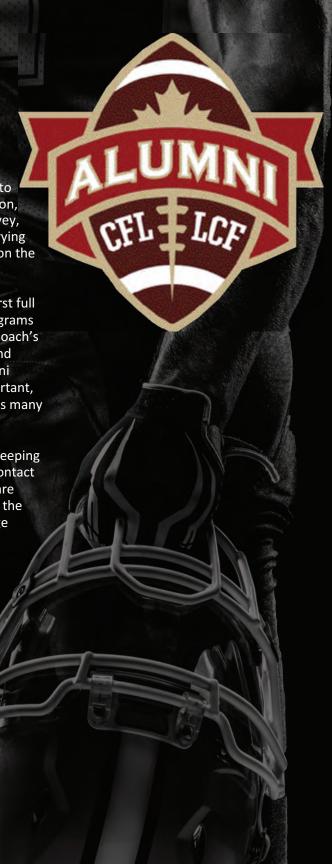

CFLAA SUPPORT FUND



Welcome

The CFLAA Support Fund was created by members of the Canadian Football League Alumni Association (CFLAA) to offer support to fellow Alumni experiencing a medical challenge which has created a financial hardship.

The career in the CFL is short. The salaries and pensions small compared to other professional leagues and other careers. The post career medical benefits non-existent. There is an old saying amongst Alumni. "We never retire from a CFL career; we merely have a career change."

There are NO other programs, plans or funds available. The CFL Alumni Support Fund relies primarily on money we raise at the CFL Alumni Grey Cup Legends Luncheon and other events during the course of the year. The fund also has received limited amounts from donations by the, CFLPA, CFL and local Alumni Associations. The largest contributor is the Never Alone Foundation Rose Project; these funds are given to those who have been diagnosed with cancer. Thank you, Lyle Bauer and the Never Alone Foundation!

Applications for the Alumni Support Fund are evaluated by a committee formed by the CFLAA. Applications and awarding of funds are confidential (the recipient determines the degree of disclosure, if any). The applicant information is handled according to criteria approved by the Board. The CFLASF committee vets any application with the assistance of the executive director. The final decision is made by the CFLASF committee which reports to the CFLAA Board of Directors. The Funds are not given to the player directly, but rather to the health provider, pharmacist, or wherever makes the most sense.

We have been able to help a few our guys along the way.

Recently the fund has provided funds to assist former players living in the United States with medical expenses to assist in their recovery from joint replacement surgeries.

The CFLASF has helped cover medications for a 35-year-old former player who is fighting a life threatening rare form of cancer and whose provincial plan does not cover some of the medications. He is unable to work and is relying on small government assistance.

A neighbour notified us of a former player who has a physical disability and has been struggling to make ends meet in some areas of his life. He was to the point he was selling personal belongings to pay for food and clothing. The CFLASF now helps with his monthly medication bills on an ongoing basis.

The fund was able to provide support to Rick Sowieta, directly and through our Associations, using crowd-funding, Many fans, friends and family members made donations so Rick Sowieta could receive treatment in hopes of curing his pancreatic cancer to save his life. Unfortunately, he succumbed. Rest in Peace our friend.

In need of post operation therapy and with his CFLPA benefits no longer available (only covers one year after retirement) Johnathan Hefney reached out to the CFLAA. Through the CFLASF we have paid for two rounds of physical therapy. He has made incredible gains in his movement, strength and reduction of pain.

These are but a few stories. We have helped many. many more but who, understandably, would like to remain anonymous. We are grateful to the alumni (typically teammates), family, friends, neighbours, and fans who help bring their plight to our attention, so we can help.

We expect as it becomes more and more acceptable for men to share their personal situations and ask for help there will be more and more demand for support. We also know that with the recent awareness and reality of the long term effects on the body and mind from playing football the demand will only increase.

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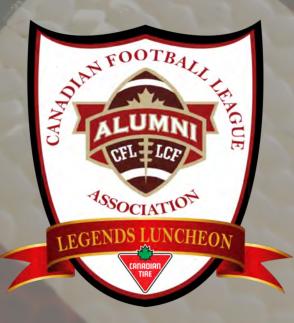
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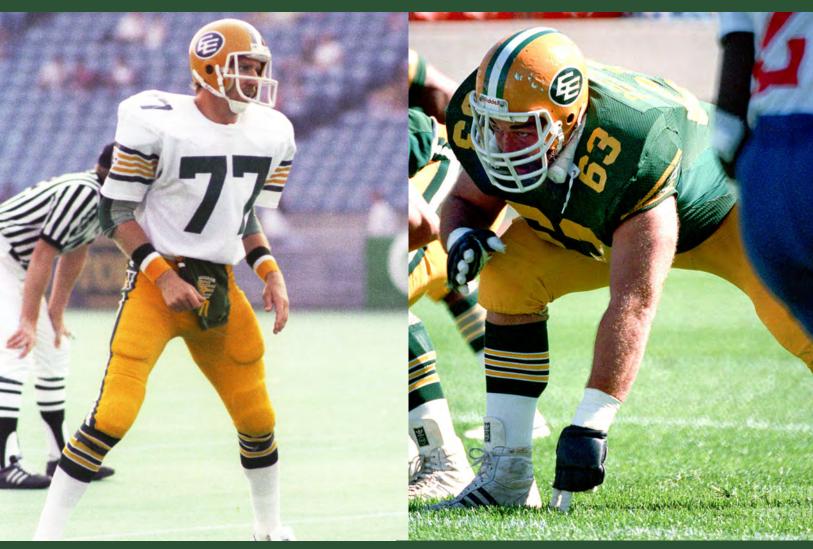

LINDA WOOD EDWARDS: ALWAYS CHEERING US ON

To call Linda a fan of the game is an understatement.

As a child, her family had a rule: everyone had to have a team. It didn't have to be mom or dad's team, but you had to have a team. Linda's father was, of course, a Roughriders' man; he played for Regina Roughriders in the 1930s. "He was an enforcer, not a speed guy," said Linda. Linda's mother was a Stampeders' fan. Her brothers cheered their heros – Sam Etchverry, Tommy Joe Coffey, Angelo Mosca – before eventually settling on Edmonton as their team. Linda's team was and still is Edmonton, but she also supports every team in the league and their alumni. Since its inception, Linda has been the self-titled "governance nerd" for the CFLAA, a role that Executive Director & Founder Leo Ezerins, describes as critical to its success. "Linda is the stabilizing force and we definitely wouldn't be where we are today without her guidance," said Leo.



Linda was recruited to the CFLAA by Hector Pothier. The two met to discuss a fundraiser idea Linda had for the Eskimos Alumni Association. "I was a little nervous, to be honest, to be meeting this football god," recalled Linda. Hector was impressed by Linda's passion for the game and her expertise in the area of governance. In her, he saw a valuable team-player and invited her to attend the founding meeting of the CFLAA. Governance is to boards what good wiring is to a house. If it is installed properly, you can almost forget it's there, but if it isn't done correctly, the whole house could burn down. Linda is a stickler for things being done right, especially when it is for something as important as the CFL.



She has attended Eskimos games religiously for the past 28 years and hasn't missed a Grey Cup since 1995. She had a green and gold wedding, entered the reception hall to the Eskimos fight song, and was to be permitted to have wedding pictures taken on the Commonwealth field. Before and even after the wedding, she went through a long football negotiation: she had season tickets on the East side and her hubby had them on the West side and neither wanted to move due to superstition.



They built a shrine to football in their home, and have amassed an impressive collection of football paraphernalia, including CFL Royal Stafford tea cups, old programs, photos, jerseys for every team, books by CFL players, and even a piece of turf from Winnipeg and a part of a seat from the old stadium in Hamilton. As a teenager, she tried out for the Edmonton Eskimos cheerleaders, but sadly didn't make the cut. Of the disappointment, Linda quipped, "It's nothing that many years and thousands of dollars of therapy can't fix."

Linda's intense loyalty to the game has drawn the attention of others: TSN did a piece on Linda and Brian in 2012 and one day in 2003, Rick and Jeri Campbell showed up on their doorstep. Linda recalled Brian saying: "There's a guy on our doorstep with a really good replica of the Cup. You want to see this?" Irritated by the interruption to her work, Linda entered the room scowling and was left speechless she realized it was the real McCoy, held by Coach Campbell.

Being at a loss for words is not common for Linda. She has written many plays including True Grid, a play that captures the superstitions, the camaraderie, and intense highs and lows that CFL fans experience. Set in 2006, the year the Eskimos' playoff streak was broken, the play was an homage to all the loyal football fans she has met across the country. "I wanted to pay tribute to all the thousands who freeze their asses off and never give up on their team," said Linda.

True Grid was performed twice, at the Edmonton Fringe Festival in 2006 and again in 2010 at the Grey Cup in Edmonton as a fundraiser for the CFLAA. (Writer's note: I played Mary) The play was so full of insider jokes and CFL-specific details that the fans in the audience frequently elbowed each other or yelled out loud: "That's you, Joe!! You totally do that!!" Linda wanted the play to be a 'celebration of our weirdness' and a gift to the fans. "I also saw the play as a way to build bridges. People who loved football but had never been to a play were sitting beside people who loved theatre but had never been to a game," said Linda. True Grid also created a bridge between Linda, Hector and the CFLAA.

Linda is proud to be able to support the League with her governance expertise and admits she receives something precious in return. "Once a month, I get to be with these guys — warriors of the game — that I wouldn't get to see otherwise. I get to hear them kibitzing before the meeting starts about anything from who is up, who is down, who had the best hair, and of course football. Even now when I receive a text from one of these guys, it's still a thrill. I'm such a fan at heart."

Leo says the admiration goes both ways. "When Linda talks, everyone listens. For me, she is an anchor, the backbone of the board. She's been there every step of the way: 10 meetings a year, plus every AGM held at Grey Cup and she facilitated our strategic plans and built the corporate governance documents," recounted Leo. And when the CFLAA board faced a legal challenge a few years back, Linda helped everyone maintain composure and made sure that everything was done correctly. "After all these years, she is still cheering us on," said Leo with a smile.

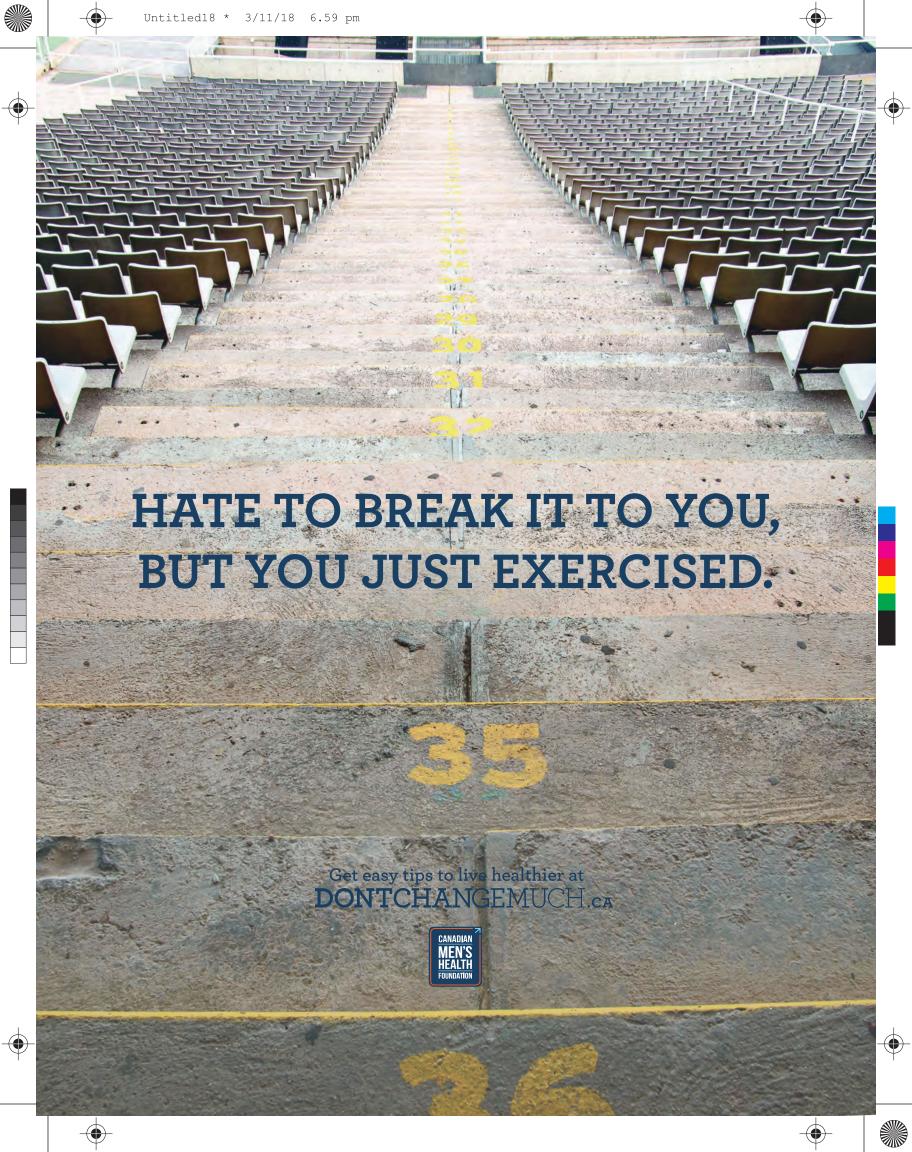
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The Complete Grey Cup Experience....Memories of 2010

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CFLAA Partners in a Medical Cannabis Study

On October 17, Canada became the first G20 nation to legalize cannabis for recreational use, creating headlines across North America and around the globe.

This significant policy shift has also opened the door for more conversations around the use of medical cannabis. Through a prescription from a medical doctor and completing a registration with Health Canada, Canadians have had access to medical cannabis in a variety of product forms for many years now. For former professional athletes, particularly those who have sustained repeated critical injuries over their lengthy careers, this access is all too important.

Earlier this year, the CFL Alumni Association entered into a collaboration with Canadian Licensed Producer MedReleaf for an observational study on the use of medical cannabis for the treatment of chronic pain and arthritis. This landmark study will lend greater awareness to the potential health benefits of using medical cannabis in the treatment of ailments traditionally managed by opiates and other more severe treatment forms. The joint observational study has begun working with volunteer CFLAA members and continues to recruit more individuals to participate in this groundbreaking initiative.

Edmonton..."City of Quarterbacks"

Its' been said that if you don't have good quarterback play, you're at a severe disadvantage. It's the pivotal position for any team, the driver of the engine. No matter how talented the rest of your offence is, without good play from the QB position, things usually don't come together. Alternately, great QB play can elevate the rest of the team.

Many teams spend year after year searching for the right "driver" and occasionally hit on one, such as Montreal and Anthony Calvillo. But those "hits' are often surrounded by years before and after of poor to average QB play.

And then there is Edmonton. A team that has for the most part consistently "hit" on QB's. With barely an occasional blip of average play, the Eskimos have more or less moved successively from one Hall of Fame QB to the next for almost the last 50 years!

Consider this, since 1972 the Eskimos have employed 5 successive QB's that have gone one to be inducted into the Canadian Football Hall of Fame (Wilkinson, Moon, Dunigan, Ham, Allen & McManus). Most recently, Ricky Ray and Mike Reilly are likely destined to join them once their careers are over.

In 2006, when TSN announced its top 50 players of all time, 3 former Eskimo pivots cracked the top 50 (Moon #5, Allen #14 and Dunigan #39) while Wilkinson, Ham and McManus received honourable mention.

Tom Wilkinson was the first to lead the way. He was a three time Western and CFL All-Star in 1974, 1978 and 1979. Tom was named the Outstanding Player in the CFL in 1974 and was the runner-up in 1978. He played in 8 Grey Cups and won 5. He was named to the Edmonton Eskimo Wall of Fame and in 1987.

His successor, Warren Moon won 5 successive Grey Cups from 1978 – 1982 and won the offensive Grey Cup Most Valuable Player award in the 1980 and 1982 and became the first professional quarterback to pass for 5,000 yards in a season by reaching exactly 5,000 yards in 1982. In his final CFL season of 1983, he threw for a league record 5,648 yards and won the CFL's Most Outstanding Player Award.

Matt Dunigan was the first of 3 successive QB's who were known as much for their running prowess as well as their passing. Matt racked up 732 yards in 1984 and 737 yards in 1985, which at the time was a CFL record for yards rushing by a QB. He led the Eskimos to two Grey Cup appearances is 1986 and '87 winning the latter. He was also a CFL All Star in 1985.

Damon Allen had two terms with the Eskimos and was also known for him scrambling ability. He played in 3 Grey Cups while with the Eskimos, winning in 1987 and 1993.

Tracy Ham played 6 years with the Eskimos and became the first CFL quarterback to rush for over 1,000 yards with 1,005 on 125 carries and with 10 touchdowns in 1989 and followed it up with 1,096 in 1990. 1989, was Ham's best season as he was named to the Western and All-Canadian All-Star teams and was named the Outstanding Player in the CFL. He was part of the Grey Cup team in 1987 and lost in 1990.

Jason Maas and Ricky Ray had a few successful seasons together before Ray to the reigns. They went to 3 Grey Cups in 2002, 2003 and 2005, winning the last two. Ricky Ray was also a CFL All-Star in 2006.

For the past 6 seasons Mike Reilly has been amongst the top QB's in the league. He has been a 2 time Western All-Star, a CFL All-Star and Most Outstanding Player in 2017. He also won the Grey Cup in 2016.

For the past 50 years, Eskimo QB's (& tandems) have consistently ranked among the leaders in both touchdowns and passing yards. They have ranked in the top 3 for both touchdowns thrown and yardage in 32 of those 50 years!

Congratulations to the Eskimo organization for their success at the pivotal position!

The Canadian Football League Alumni Association is proud to announce that a pair of revered Edmonton Eskimo Alumni will be recognized as co – "Man of the Year" honouree's at this year's CFLAA Legends Luncheon during Grey Cup Festival in Edmonton.

Brian Fryer and Hector Pothier were not only very accomplished athletes during their playing careers but outstanding citizens that continued to give back to the community in their post playing careers.

"Man of the Year" honourees are chosen by the CFLAA Executive Board to recognize a lifetime of achievements both on and off the field in the host Grey Cup city.



Brian Fryer



As a native Edmontonian, Brian Fryer began his football career at the University of Alberta where he was a two-time CIS All-Star, Most Outstanding Player finalist in 1974 and Hec Creighton Award Winner in 1975. Recognized as one of the best wide receivers of all-time, Brian set numerous CIS records during his 4 year University career.

In 1976, he was the first Canadian college player to be drafted to the NFL and make the team as a rookie for the Washington Redskins. In 1978 he returned to Edmonton and was a member of the five-in-a-row Grey Cup Champions during his 8 year Eskimo career.

Since his retirement in 1985, Brian has been employed as the Executive Director of Football Alberta, administering all amateur football programs in the province. Since 1995, Brian is still an active member of the Edmonton Eskimo Alumni Association as a Director, President and chair of Casino and Scholarship committees.

"It is an honor to be awarded the CFLAA Man of the Year along with Hector. Its' great to be appreciated for all of the work we do for the Alumni that supports numerous amateur football programs and charitable activities in the community. I have been fortunate to be involved with Football Alberta as the Executive Director for the last three decades. Many programs have evolved over that time that has helped develop thousands of players and coaches from grassroots to stadium.

In 2013, Brian was inducted into the Canadian Football Hall of Fame in recognition of his CIS playing career with the Alberta Golden Bears. He was also inducted into the Alberta Schools Athletic Association Sports Hall of Fame in 2008 and inducted into the City of Edmonton's Sports Hall of Fame in 2005. As well he is inducted into the Alberta Sports Hall of Fame as part of the team awards for winning the Grey Cup 5 years in a row (1978–82).



Hector Pothier



Hector Pothier was green and gold start to finish as he played his entire 12 year career (1978-89) with the Edmonton Eskimos. Hector was an outstanding offensive lineman, as he was recognized as a CFL All-Star, 4 time Western All-Star and winner of the Tom Pate award for dedication to community service. As a leader and key member of the offensive line, he helped the team win 6 Grey Cup Championships.

Post CFL career, Hector has been a teacher and principal in the Edmonton public school system since 1990 and has volunteered extensively in the community as a coach, referee, YMCA Board member and key organizer for many Eskimo alumni events. Involvement in the community has always been a priority in Hector's life.

CFLAA "MAN OF THE YEAR" HONOUREES

"As a football player and then as a teacher I have always had a firm belief that one must give back to the community. As a principal, our school has a long tradition of teaching our students of giving back to society. That no matter how tough you think your life is, there are always some with bigger problems. We have each class do an annual community project which gives back in some way to the community. Whether it be cleaning the school fields, collecting clothing to donate to those in need or supporting the Terry Fox Annual Run for Cancer, our students are actively involved with and reminded of the need to contribute positively to society."

He has been a member of the Edmonton Eskimo Alumni Board of Directors for last 26 years, a key organizer and participant in many alumni community endeavors and President of the CFLAA from 2009-2016. He is also one of the founders of the CFL Alumni Association.

"I am proud to have been involved with the CFLAA since its inception. Under the tremendous work and guidance of Leo Ezerins, I firmly believe that the CFLAA has made a difference in connecting Alumni Associations around the league. It has led to increased communication between each association, which in turn has led to the sharing of common practices and motivated other associations to match some of the community service and work being done across the league."

Current CLFAA President Brett MacNeil recognizes Hector as a mentor for his current Presidency. "Hector was an imposing and iconic figure on the Edmonton offensive line for a long and illustrious twelve year career. As the inaugural President of the CFLAA Hector has continued to support CFL Alumni and minor football initiatives long after his retirement from the CFL. Hector has acted as a mentor to me as CFLAA Past President and will always remain one of my idols from the historic Grey Cup run that Hector and Edmonton accomplished in the 70s and 80s (except for beating Ottawa lol). I am proud to say that we both played for Cal Murphy and that I have followed in Hector's footsteps as a CFL Offensive lineman, Edmonton Eskimo and CFLAA President".

Hector has also been a key driver in the development of "Legend Luncheon" which has grown to be one of the premier events on Grey Cup weekend.

"The Canadian Tire CFLAA Legends Lunch is a wonderful example of the work the CFLAA is doing across the league. Our Support Fund is growing each year due to the efforts of each association in ensuring that the Legends Lunch is a successful fundraiser. 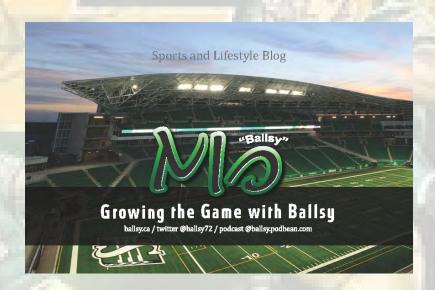

HAMILTON TIGER-CATS ALUMNI 2018 YEAR IN REVIEW

It was another progressive and eventful year for the Tiger-Cat Alumni Association. Incoming President Ryan Donnelly ushered in a new mandate for the Association to "get younger". While still at an impressive 165 members, the majority of Alumni played ball in the 20th Century. Our new "youth movement" brought in new blood like Rob Hitchcock, Sandy Beveridge, Dave Stala, Brian Hilk and Obie Spanic. Many of these "youngsters" were on hand for our 33rd Annual Golf Tournament to unofficially "Kick-off" our season.





Our "Wall of Honour" Induction returned this year after a 6 year hiatus. In partnership with the Club, the HTCAA hosted a very memorable event to induct its' newest member "Joe Montford". After a very successful 8 year Tiger-Cat career, Joe was finally recognized as the 23rd honouree to have his name permanently displayed at Tim Horton's Field. Joe amassed 135 sacks to go along with 35 forced fumbles and 18 recoveries; He was a 5-time CFL All-Star and 3-time CFL Most Outstanding Defensive Player. He was voted #40 of the Top 50 CFL players of all time and was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 2011.





The HTCAA also had some other members that were honoured this year. Former Tiger-Cat player and Coach Don Sutherin was inducted into the Hamilton Sports Hall of Fame; outstanding offensive lineman Dave Hack was inducted into the Tiger-Cat Fan Clubs "Walk of Fame" and 1960's QB Frank Cosentino was inducted into the Canadian Football Hall of Fame as a builder. Renovations were also completed this year at Tim Horton's Field to house the Hall of Fame on the Club level. All inductee busts are now permanently displayed along with a rotating variety of artifacts from the Halls' storage archives.

One of Hamilton's newest high schools will be named for Tiger-Cat Alumnus Bernie Custis, a local sports legend, long-time educator and the first black quarterback to play for a professional football team in North America.

Cutis's professional career began with the Tiger-Cats in August 1951. He was named an all-star in his first season before moving to running back and eventually winning the Grey Cup with the team in 1953. Custis went on to become a teacher and principal with the former Wentworth County Board of Education and a coach for the McMaster Marauders, where he spent eight seasons and was named Canadian university football's coach of the year in 1982.



Dan Black, aka "Pigskin Pete" has retired from his role as official Ti-Cat cheerleader. Citing personal reasons and a desire to spend and focus more time on family, Dan led his last "Oskee Wee Wee" on Labour Day this year. Dan has played the role of "Pigskin Pete" for the past 10 seasons. The Tiger-Cats say they are now looking for a new Pigskin Pete, saying they "look forward to one of the greatest fan traditions in sport continuing for years to come.".

Up-dates were made our web-site www.htcaa.ca as we strive to meet of our "Associations Mission" to preserve and promote the history of the Hamilton Tiger-Cats, We have added video highlights of past Tiger-Cat Grey Cup appearances along with statistical records for the club and team rosters by year.

Finally we would like to remember those Alumni that have passed in last year. They include: Gene Ceppetelli; John Hohman, Bill Kyle, Harry Lampman, Ray Truant and former owners George Grant and Roger Yachetti.

CFL Ottawa Alumni Association 2018 Year in Review

For the CFL Ottawa Alumni Association (CFLOAA) the highlight of 2018 was an absolutely incredible weekend celebrating the 1968 and 1969 Grey Cup winning Ottawa Rough Rider teams that was held on August 10th and 11th. The weekend was organized by the CFL Ottawa Alumni Association and the Ottawa Redblacks.

This is the only Ottawa Rough Rider team to ever repeat as Grey Cup champions. There were only 36 players on these two teams with 29 on both teams. Eight guys plus Coach Frank Clair are in the Canadian Football Hall of Fame (Russ Jackson, Ron Stewart, Whit Tucker, Soupy Campbell, Moe Racine, Ken Lehmann, Gene Gaines and Don Sutherin). In addition, three of the other players went on to excellent NFL careers (Bo Scott, Vic Washington and Margene Adkins).

Surprisingly, two Grey Cup records set in 1968 and 1969 still stand today. Vic Washington's 1968 iconic 80 yard TD run (including a fumble that bounced right back into his hands) is still the longest run ever. Russ Jackson's 4 TD passes in 1969 is still the most ever in a Grey Cup game which is surprising given the increasing emphasis on passing over the years and that lots of Grey Cups have been played indoors. The 1969 team was also selected as the Canadian Press "Team of the Year" beating out the Montreal Canadiens who won the Stanley Cup in both 1968 and 69.

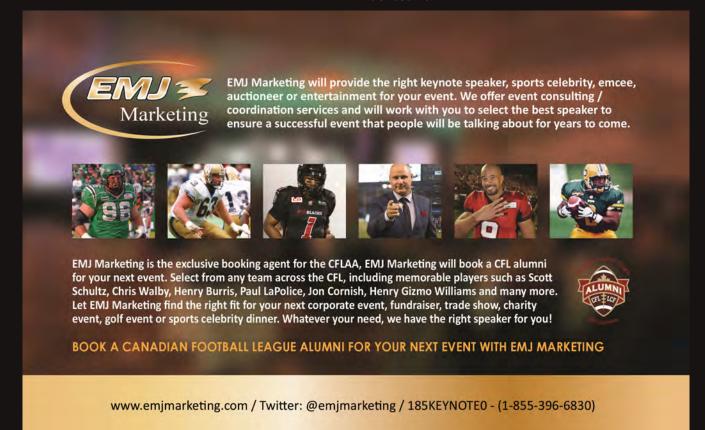
Twenty-two of the 24 players who are still alive and six family members representing those players who have passed away plus the late Frank Clair's daughter Robin and Arthur and Ken Loeb, the sons of the late Owner David Loeb all attended.

1968 and 69 teammates Jim Cain (CFLAA VP) and Russ Jackson along with Randy Burgess, VP Communications and Content of OSEG/Redblacks were key members of the organizing committee. The reunion weekend would not have happened without the amazing support of many other staff members of OSEG/Redblacks as well the CFLOAA that provided organizational and financial support.

The dinner Friday night, held in The Otto's Club area of the south side stands at TD Place was the perfect kickoff to what was a once in a lifetime experience for the 1968 and 1969 team members and their families. On the Saturday a social gathering was held at the Prescott Hotel at noon to raise a glass in honour of those teammates who have passed away. This was a more relaxing setting for the sharing of old stories and intermingling with family members. Prior to the evening game, the players or their family representative were introduced in the TD Place Arena to a large crowd of Ottawa football fans followed by an autograph session that went well into the first quarter of the Redblacks - Alouettes game.

At halftime all the players or their family representatives were escorted to mid-field. After the Grey Cup was escorted onto the field by the RCMP, everyone was introduced to the sold-out Redblacks crowd. Members of the 1969 team were presented with their 1969 Grey Cup Champion rings which they had not received after their victory so many years ago by Arthur and Ken Loeb sons of the former owner the late David Loeb.

It was a wonderful weekend of new memories for the players and their families of these two back to back Grey Cup winning Rough Rider teams.

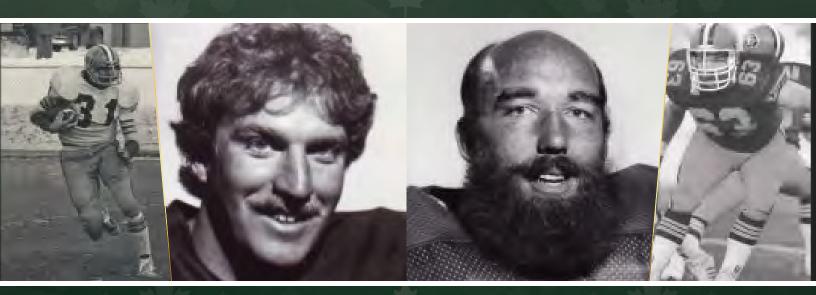

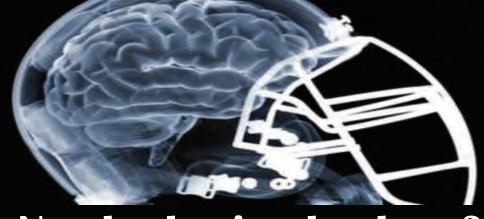

The **Canadian Concussion Centre** is the world's first program dedicated to a four-pronged approach to concussions: research, education, diagnosis and treatment. The project is based at the Krembil Neuroscience Centre at the University Health Network's **Toronto Western Hospital**, and is led by internationally acclaimed concussion expert, **Dr. Charles Tator**. The team includes world leaders in brain injury, cognition, imaging, mental health and clinical care working together to determine how concussions can affect us all

The CFL Alumni Association has taken a leadership role in promoting research and awareness of brain injury and concussion. The advisory group includes former players, **Leo Ezerins**, **Matt Dunigan**, former CFL Commissioner, Honourable **Roy McMurtry**, former NHL hockey player **Ken Dryden** as well as a number of prominent business executives, led by SmartCenters owner **Mitchell Goldhar**.

The research is designed to better understand the full spectrum of concussions, in particular, persistent symptoms of concussion and the delayed effects of multiple concussions.

The MISSION is to identify who has and who is at risk of developing the delayed neurodegeneration associated with multiple concussions. We are developing better <u>diagnostic</u> tools to detect the effects of multiple concussions, and we are trying to figure out the <u>underlying causes</u> of their long term effects. All of the above information is used to <u>develop mechanism-based treatments</u> to prevent or minimize the enduring effects of multiple concussions
